



TKC 2 THRESHOLD

But now...Forget the former things; do not dwell on the past. See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it? - Isaiah 43:1a,18-19a NIV

have two teenagers who graduated high school in May. Their summer has been one of discovery, relaxation and fun. Through it all I have been contemplating what would be their next steps and recognized some anxiety surrounding the topic. It is as if they have approached a threshold and



What a concept-a threshold. I am not sure why this concept resonated so much with me during the message. Was it because we had just finished a wonderful General Assembly in Louisville (the first in four years)? Was it because it was my birthday (and I had been blessed with another year of life)? Was it because I now had language to describe the unusual reluctance to move forward that I witnessed in my youngest children? I am not sure, but it really stuck with me. Maybe, just maybe it was because we are at this threshold place in both our world and in our church, with feelings of disorientation due to the **dramatic changes we have experienced.** The threshold between love vs hate, fear and anger have left us a little disoriented. We have been desperately trying to get back to what was, to return to the comfort zone, the state of equilibrium we all naturally move toward. Beloved, I am so glad because even in the midst of such change we have a word of Hope found in our text, that can reorient and ground us in truth. All I know is that in a spiritual sense, we cannot go back to what was, because

it is no longer here. So let us not be consumed by fear and trepidation and start moving into our God-given future.

Diana Butler Bass suggests in her book Christianity After Religion that what looks like the end of Christendom may be the beginning of another Great Awakening.

"Awakenings begin when old systems break down, in 'periods of cultural distortion and grave personal stress, when we lose faith in the legitimacy of our norms, the viability of our institutions and the authority of our leaders in church and state.' A "critical disjunction" in how we perceive ourselves, God, and the world arises from the stress. The end of the old opens the way for the new."

God is indeed doing a new thing and God will continue doing new things, in new ways. Will you cross over the threshold into what God intends for you and your ministry?

It remains an honor and a privilege to have been called to serve clergy, laity and the nearly 200 congregations that make up the Christian Church in Kentucky during a very challenging, yet exciting period in our history.

2023 RECONCILIATION OFFERING

he office of General Minister and President has set aside **September 24 and October 1 as the** days for the 2023 Reconciliation Offering. This serves as a reminder to all Disciples that we are an Anti-Racist/Pro-Reconciliation movement, a reminder that was also issued at the 2023 General Assembly with the passing of GA-2341: Calling the Church to Oppose Christian **Nationalism.** Here are a few words from the background description from that resolution:

Christian Nationalism contends that government and public policy at every level of civic life (from national government to state and provincial legislatures to hyper-local boards, such as school boards, library boards, city councils, and the like) should reflect values identified with an extremely restrictive Christian ideology that upholds nativism, white supremacy, xenophobia, and heteropatriarchy. Christian Nationalism asserts that this form of Christianity should be privileged in public life over other belief systems, and that power belongs in the hands of persons who are white, natural-born citizens.

This is an important resolution, and the work of the Anti-Racist/Pro-Reconciliation ministry team is important as well. This team has been working hard over the past few years to make sure all the clergy in our region have received anti-racism training through the curriculum "Seeing the Face of God in Each Other."

In recent months, several congregations in our region have hosted this same training for their members. This has been a blessing as the ultimate goal is to build up a church and a region that is, in its entirety, anti-racist.

That work is continuing as we are now hoping to host a District-Wide training event. The idea is that one congregation will host, while the other congregations in that district will bring members and lay leaders to the event (clergy are, of course, welcome too).

And finally, remember the words of the Apostle Paul: There is neither Jew nor Gentile, neither slave nor free, nor is there male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus. - Galatians 3:28

Please continue to pray for this ministry. Support it however you are able. And participate in it as time and opportunity allow.

between Samaritan, Roman and Jew
who offered fresh sight to the blind and freedom to captives,
help us to break down the barriers in our community,

HOW ABOUT SOME GOOD NEWS

There are days when being an Associate Regional Minister is rough - not going to lie. But there are days that make an old pastor's heart sing, even when the world is (sometimes literally) on fire.

I work with the Committee on Ministry – four teams of clergy and laity that help guide folks who are called to ministry as they go through the process; whether ordained or commissioned, chaplaincy or education, bi-vocational or full time. We are looking to add an additional five or six candidates in the next few weeks. **Good news.**

In the last week we heard one candidate speak of finding their joy in the pastorate. Another spoke of the realization that one of the 'essentials' of our denomination is the quality of treating each human being with the respect that comes from being a child of God. A third spoke about seeing their church reaching out to include everyone – their words and their actions were one. **Good news.**

I preached last month in Chaplin, Kentucky at the Chaplin Christian Church (Disciples of Christ). Josh Simpson is their minister; he is a commissioned bivocational pastor. The Sunday I was there, the church was full of happy folks – fourteen of which were youth. Fourteen. Who came out of Sunday School talking about Moses leading his people through the Red Sea. Did I mention fourteen youth? **Good news.**

Yesterday my husband and I attended a concert held on a very hot afternoon in the sanctuary of the church to which we now belong: First Christian Church,

Lawrenceburg. (We don't get to be there much on Sunday mornings because I travel to different pulpits a lot, but it's our church.) Rev. Keith McAliley (music director and organist of FCC), Angela Easton (pianist of FCC), and Kris Anderson (member of FCC and musician on many occasions) all performed rhapsodies – from Brahms to Albeniz to Gershwin to Mercury (as in Freddy Mercury - we heard "Bohemian Rhapsody"!). The bulletin stated that the definition of the word rhapsody is based on a Latin derivation from a Greek word meaning 'to stitch'. Those musicians put time and effort into producing a concert that raised \$2,750 for Bridgeport Christian

Church in Frankfort, to help them rebuild after a fire. **Good news.**

On days when the world seems to be falling apart, let us remember our siblings in Christ; the ones who can see hope in welcoming others, the ones who dance as they leave Sunday School because they learned a story about Moses, the ones who work to provide help to others – not out of charity but because we're family.

Family. Stitched together by the song of Love. Church, listen: that's good news.


