Are We Reconciled?

 11 Since, then, we know what it is to fear the Lord, we try to persuade others. What we are is plain to God, and I hope it is also plain to your conscience....¹⁷ Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come:[a] The old has gone, the new is here! 18 All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ and gave us the ministry of reconciliation: 19 that God was reconciling the world to himself in Christ, not counting people's sins against them. And he has committed to us the message of reconciliation. 20 We are therefore Christ's ambassadors, as though God were making his appeal through us. We implore you on Christ's behalf: Be

reconciled to God." 2 Corinthians 5:11, 17-20 NIV

econciliation is difficult as it requires acknowledgement of causing enmity, and forgiveness for what has occurred. Let me share my struggle as of late: are we actually reconciled, being reconciled, or even working toward reconciliation? The deeper question is: as children of the Most-High God, do we understand that we are called to be ministers of reconciliation and ambassadors for Christ? In a culture that highlights only biblical texts that fits its itching ears and contextualizes the rest, can we agree that the ethic of love supersedes our itching ears? This may be a scary thought, but it's been weighing heavily on my heart and spirit.

The dictionary defines reconciliation as the restoration of friendly relations and/or action of making one view or belief compatible with another. Biblically, reconciliation is the restoration of creation into the right relationship with the Creator. I was reminded recently that reconciliation is challenging, as we explored the life of Jacob at the Men's Spiritual Retreat. Jacob was fearful and running from his brother Esau, as he had wronged him by stealing his birthright. But the bible suggests that they were reconciled. The biblical account reveals some marks of reconciliation, acknowledgment of wrong-doing, as well as forgiveness, grace, and mercy. Is it possible that remembering our past and acknowledging historic wrongs is at the heart of our current social, cultural, political and religious divide? I think it is! Let's talk.

The difficulty of reconciliation had my hope of reconciliation on life support, as my eyes were focused on the end goal, as opposed to the journey of reconciliation. God reminded and restored my hope through the prophet Isaiah:

The wolf will live with the lamb, the leopard will lie down with the goat, the calf and the lion and the yearling^[a] together; and a little child will lead them. The cow will feed with the bear, their young will lie down together, and the lion will eat straw like the ox. The infant will play near the cobra's den, and the young child will put its hand into the viper's nest. They will neither harm nor destroy on all my holy mountain, for the earth will be filled with the knowledge of the Lord as the waters cover the sea. Isaiah 11:6-9 (NIV)

THERE IS HOPE as the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) in the US & Canada is a movement for wholeness in a fragmented world...welcoming all to the Lord's Table as God has welcomed us, making reconciliation a top priority as part of its merger and restructure since 1969.

THERE IS HOPE as the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) in Kentucky is moving in our call to be ministers of reconciliation, becoming a Pro-Reconciling/Anti-Racist region, and sharing stories as we see the face of God in each other.

THERE IS HOPE as we are all able to participate in the work of reconciliation through our stewardship of time, talent, and our treasure through the Special Offering lifted up this season for the assistance of programing, training, and advocacy for reconciliation.

THERE IS HOPE as I close with this prayer adapted from Black Liturgies by Cole Arthur Riley for the Opening Convocation at Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary.

God of the table, meet us as and wherever we gather. Help us to make space to delight in the sacred community we've been given. For every time we're together, let us look up and truly see one another's faces. Allow the sacredness of our moments together to be realized. Remind us that it's not our work and our presence alone that is holy, but our work and presence shared-holiness in community, saving each other again and again. May you open our eyes to recognize your divine spark among and within every one of us. And may this table be the site of true welcome and belonging, where all are invited into worship and community. Amen.

It remains an honor and a privilege to have been called to serve clergy, laity, and the nearly 200 congregations that make up the Christian Church in Kentucky during a very challenging and yet exciting period in our history.

Beyond Brokenness - Building Beloved Community

he Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. writes in his autobiography, "Hate is just as injurious to the hater as it is to the hated. Like an unchecked cancer, hate corrodes the personality and eats away its vital unity. Many of our inner conflicts are rooted in hate. This is why psychiatrists say,

'Love or perish.' Hate is too great a burden to bear."

These are powerful words that point us to the truth of reconciliation: the journey to reconciliation begins in the heart of each individual person; reconciliation is the journey from hate towards compassion.

Hate divides, separating us from our neighbors. Hate blinds, restricting us from seeing the sanctity of all God's children. Hate lies, telling us the person sitting across from us is our enemy. Hate hurts, causing us and those around us moral injury.

Compassion, on the other hand, blesses. Compassion unites, bonding us to those who are different. Compassion unveils, enabling us to see the beauty of diversity. Compassion conveys, telling us the truth that all are worthy of love. Compassion heals, restoring us to wholeness.

How do we move from hate to compassion?

One, practice empathy. Empathy is the ability to understand and share the feelings of one another. Empathy is the word which goes along with the phrase "walk a mile in someone else's shoes." When we practice empathy, we place ourselves in the situation someone else is enduring. When we see what they see, hear what they hear, and feel what they feel, our hearts open. When we practice empathy, we understand, making room for love.

Two, engage in faithful conversation. Speaking with others from a different background gives us a deeper vision of what humanity is. Speaking faithfully, part of which means listening, prevents us from entering echo chambers in which we only hear the things we already believe. When we speak and listen faithfully, we break through division, making room for love.

Three, forgive. Though not always the case, hate can be rooted in past hurts. Forgiveness is an intentional decision to let go of resentment and anger. The memory of the act that hurt or offended you might always be with you, but forgiveness can lessen the pain and anger that lingers. When we forgive, we let go of hate and resentment, making room for love.

And four, embrace love. Sometimes, hate can be born of feeling unloved. For those who feel this way, leaning into love can drive away those feelings of hate. It may be the love of a friend, or even a pet, but accepting love when it is offered can change the heart. When we embrace love, we drive out hate, making room for even more love.

When hate is driven out and room is made for love, then reconciliation can occur. When we love, we are much more likely to desire and seek unity with everyone, especially those who we view as different. Only when we love can we have true reconciliation.

How good and pleasant it is when brothers and sisters live together in peace!

It is like the finest oils poured on the head, sweet-smelling oils flowing down to cover the beard, Flowing down the beard of Aaron, flowing down the collar of his robe.

It is like the gentle rain of Mount Hermon that falls on the hills of Zion.

Yes, from this place, the Eternal spoke the command, from there He gave His blessing—life forever.

Ultimately, the journey from hate to compassion is a personal transformation that opens the path to true reconciliation. By practicing empathy, engaging in meaningful dialogue, forgiving past wrongs, and embracing love, each person can contribute to a more united and healing world. Dr. King's wisdom reminds us that the choice to move toward compassion is not only necessary for others, but essential for our own well-being and wholeness. As we nurture love within ourselves, we help build a future rooted in understanding, dignity, and peace for all.

The Reconciliation Ministry Special Offering is received each year in congregations on the last Sunday in September and the first Sunday in October (in solidarity with World Communion Sunday). Funds generated by this special emphasis are used throughout the year to provide grants to ministries and congregations actively developing and implementing programs that promote our Church's Pro-Reconciliation and Anti-Racist identity. These programs and efforts seek to reveal, re-educate, and remove systemic and structural barriers in our communities that serve to deny the image of God and human thriving based on race.

Successful Outdoor Ministry Season for 2025 for the Christian Church in Kentucky

ummer 2025 was a wonderful time for Outdoor Ministry in Kentucky as both of our campgrounds, Camp Kum-Ba-Ya in Benton and Camp Wakon'Da-Ho in Yosemite welcomed campers from around the state.

At both camps, the theme was "Another Way," from InsideOut curriculum. Through small groups, keynote speakers, worship, and other activities, campers learned that God always invites us to reimagine who we are and how we do things. Bible lessons included Saul and Ananias, John the Baptist, the daughter of Zelophehad, and more.

Camp KBY continues to expand its welcome to all. In May, Terry Hart and his grandson (First Christian Church, Murray) delivered a load of lumber. John Yakel and the talented Ramp Building Team from First Christian Church, Glasgow took it from there, constructing the fifth ramp that they have built for one of our main buildings. And Dan McKeel (First Christian Church, Murray) delivered 10 new wooden benches to the camp. We are so grateful for the gifts of these disciples committed to realizing God's wide-open welcome in practical ways.

Camp WKDH also expanded its welcome to all. The long-awaited new bathhouse opened this summer. The Men's Group from First Christian Church, Lawrenceburg helped rebuild some shelters to make them more accessible to all campers. There are now concrete paths to the bathhouse and pool, to provide easier access to those facilities. And we give thanks to Hayden Durham from Beargrass Christian Church in Louisville, who built ten new campfire benches for his Eagle Scout project last spring.

Camp KBY had a fantastic summer with 182 campers registered, with nine campers registering for two camps. Two of the camps were filled to capacity (limited by the number the camp can host in our dining hall). Camp manager, Becca Teckenbrock and the directors built amazing teams of counselors, and the children, youth, and adult campers were a joy to host.

Camp WKDH also had a wonderful summer with over 470 campers in attendance, starting with Mini Camp in June and finishing with Y'all Camp over Labor Day weekend. In particular, Eighter's camp, a specialty camp operated in cooperation with Just Say Know Ministry, had close to 40 campers in attendance, a near-record high. We give thanks to Camp Manager Linda Lee, other summer employees, directors, and counselors for all their hard work to make the camping season go so

Greetings! As we transition from summer to fall, I wanted to share a recap of our summer activities and provide some updates on upcoming events.



Updates from New Church Ministry

hank you for your generous giving to the Pentecost Special Offering! We're so grateful for the ways that the whole region uplifts our new congregations. If you haven't gotten the chance to contribute to Pentecost Offering yet, you can still donate and support New Church Ministry —

both the general church ministry and our regional ministry here in Kentucky!

Giving to Pentecost Offering supports new churches in our region during some of the most formative and crucial years of their ministry. It empowers churches to have a strong launch into the world and sets them up for success for many years ahead. In our region, new congregations spend about a decade in the New Church Process before "graduating" from that process and becoming a fully chartered congregation.

This fall we're thrilled to celebrate another congregation that is becoming fully chartered — New Life in Christ Christian Church! New Life in Christ is a congregation that meets in Diersen House, a facility in Louisville for women finishing their time in incarceration. Each week on Tuesday night, residents and members of the larger community gather around the cafeteria tables of the dining room to worship together. Faith communities from across Kentucky partner with New Life in Christ to collaborate in leading worship; often contributing prayers, sermons, and music.

New Life in Christ often completes service projects together, sowing so much good into their community. They also support the women in Diersen House by offering life skills classes that equip residents to return to their lives post-incarceration, easing their transition. New Life in Christ is a robust, thriving ministry who has done incredible work in their relatively brief 12 years of life. They live into their name well — helping one another become deeply rooted in abundant new life in Jesus Christ.

It was a joy to celebrate the chartering of this incredible faith community on September 9th as they reached this milestone surrounded by the pastors who have led the congregation, regional staff members, New Church teammates, and supporters

from the community who have watched them grow for years. Congratulations, New Life in Christ Christian Church! May your future decades of ministry be as strong and impactful as your first decade.
